Ten Tips to help survive COVID-19

- Perform a financial health check of your business to decide what you can and should do to place your business in a position to weather the crisis.
- ❖ List the possible impacts COVID-19 may have on your business sales, supply chain, staffing, finance, etc. and develop mitigation strategies.
- Develop a Business Continuity Plan to identify actions you can take should your business have to close for an extended period of time.
- ❖ Identify your key employees and ensure that someone is equipped to take over their functions in the case of sickness/quarantine/death. Also ensure key information, passwords, etc. do not reside with one employee.
- ❖ Talk to key suppliers to ascertain their ability to continue to supply your business. Also, look for alternative suppliers in the event current suppliers cannot meet your request.
- Contact your insurance agent to review your existing policy to understand what you are and are not covered for in the event of an extended crisis.
- Develop a "Work from Home" Policy, if necessary, to allow employees to work from home in an effort to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.
- Manage your cash flow efficiently, and cut back on non-essential expenses, as you do not know how long the crisis will last.
- Be open with your employees and customers about the status of your operations, and what protective measures you have put in place to ensure that their health and safety is not compromised.
- ❖ Finally, be flexible **stay informed** and be ready to make necessary adjustments when things do not go according to plan.
